Bears & Bowling




Our Clifton Heights campus spent time bonding on the girls' group and young men's group trip. The girls went to Build-a-Bear and the boys went bowling.

Students then were able to share their goals, steps to get there and how the courts and community are there to support that. Students were able to ask questions about the job and the criminal justice system.
